What is the State of Play at the Multilateral Level ? (= at WIPO & WTO)




GIs Issues at WIPO

- Working Group for the Revision of the Lisbon Agreement
 - $(\rightarrow$ Recommendation for the Lisbon Assembly 2009)
- Protection of country names under the Paris Convention (Art. 6^{ter}) (SCT/21 – June 2009 : Proposal by Jamaica)
- Protection of country names and geographical indications in domain names and on the internet ?

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What are the Complementary Approaches to Multilateral Negotiations for Protecting GIs Internationally?

Complementary Approaches for International Protection of GIs (Option 1)

National GI right holders have to protect (e.g. register) and enforce their GIs in each and every foreign country of importance ...

- complicate (lack of uniform standard)
- **expensive** (costs for translations, registrations, attorneys, etc.)
- time consuming (multiplication of application procedures)
- uncertain (lack of legal certainty)

Complementary Approaches for International Protection of GIs (Option 2)

Negotiation of bilateral agreements among GI-interested countries on the mutual recognition and protection of GIs (incl. protection for the country names of the Contracting Parties)

→

Gls of each Contracting Party are **automatically** protected on the territory of the other Party against usurpation

The Possible Benefits of Bilateral Agreements on the Mutual Protection of GIs

Content of Bilateral GI-Agreement (I)

Negotiation of a bilateral agreement aiming at

protecting all or selected GIs meeting the definition

of Art. 22:1 TRIPS

■ Exchange of lists → Mutual recognition and automatic protection (= without individual registration by the GI right holders)

Content of Bilateral GI-Agreement (II)

- Protection equivalent to Article 23 TRIPS in the Contracting Parties for
 Gls of <u>all</u> products (= for agricultural, handicraft and industrial products)
 - Protection against incorrect use (for identical and similar products) and against misleading uses (for other products)
 Protection against any misuse, imitation or evocation and practice liable to mislead the consumer
 - Protection against incorrect or misleading trademarks
 - Protection against abusive homonymous indications
 - Protection for products marketed in the territory of the Parties as well as for products for export or in transit

Content of Bilateral GI-Agreement (III)

- Protection of the country names of the Contracting Parties
 - according to Article 6^{ter} Paris Convention
 - independent of GI protection
 - including adjectives, official abbreviations of the country names and translations
- Protection of flags and State emblems and their imitations in TM, design, firm names, etc.

Benefits of a bilateral GI Agreement

- In partner country:
 - No obligation for right holders to register a GI
 - Automatic recognition of the statute of a GI by the authorities
 - Efficient, affordable and effective protection of GIs
 - Efficient and effective enforcement mechanisms for GI producers
 - Absolute protection of country name
- Publicity of GIs → no TM[®] for products not originating in true place of origin

Example of a concrete benefit thanks to Bilateral Agreement: Abuse of Swiss GI in Spain






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Roadmap for a Better International Protection of Geographical Indications
