Arise+ Indonesia – Trade Support Facility


- Is one of the flagship initiatives under the EU-Indonesia cooperation framework.

12 third countries GIs are protected in Indonesia




GIs in Indonesia



- DGIP (under the Ministry of Law and Human Rights National Competent Authority) is the main actor for GI development in Indonesia. **Top-Down approach.** DGIP supports establishment of <u>GI producers' associations (MPIGs)</u>, <u>prepare product specification and encourage and lodge products registration.</u> Sui Generis Regulation for GIs since 2016,
- Every single GI in Indonesia is lodge and manage by a dedicated MPIG created for that scope with (very often) limited understanding and capacity to manage the organisation and enforce control along the value chains
- Formal legal base for GI control in Indonesia. GI legal frame in Indonesia requires auto control by operators and periodical external control by Team of Experts (nominated by National Competent Authority)
- Team of Experts is composed by government official + Indonesian experts. In the group, there are **no specific skills/resources to carry out professional audits over** MPIGs.
- Audits are periodically scheduled on GI associations to monitor the overall "functioning and health status" of the GI projects rather than the compliance of the product with the relevant specifications

- GI market monitoring and control over the use of GI names is almost absent providing the

Arise+ Intervention to support GIs in Indonesia

- Hand-in-hand support provided to 7 GI communities to strengthen capacities of associations and implement traceability, internal control end third party certification
 - IT based traceability system
 - Creation of Internal Control Plans, train and appoint internal inspectors and facilitate external audit and certification by accredited control

Result: Seven Indonesian GI products are now traceable and certified






GI product traceability in Indonesia

An IT system (software as a service) and application for traceability has been prepared and applied to seven different GI products









Arise + GI product Control

- Despite the Indonesian legal frame does not foresee third party control performed by private certification body, DGIP + in coordination with ARISE+ agreed to test this new approach to 7 Indonesian GI products.
- Best practices are now available in Indonesia for both private sector and government authorities
- Using external GI certificates, Indonesian GI consortiums applied for registration under Regulation (EU) No 1151/2012



Open Challenges for GI system in Indonesia

- What next? How to scale up successful experiences in Indonesia
 - Arise+ Indonesia is ending soon
 - EU forthcoming technical assistance programmes in the region seems to be focused on other priorities



Professional control system needs support Facility Funded by the European Union

- Indonesian GI products have difficult access to the market but need market recognition and premium prices to maintain professional control and traceability along value chains
- Importers/traders do not currently pay premium prices for GIs certification unlike other certifications schemes
- Gl associations (MPIG) hardly recognize the value created by professional use of traceability system and Gl certification: motivation to keep traceability and certification is weak if not associated with a premium price. (despite experiences demonstrated that direct selling price increased up to 600 % after Gl development -AMED SALT-)
- Monitor the use of GI names in marketplace and persecute frauds, should be strengthened to secure value addition for IPR holders

Open Challenge for GI system in Indonesia

- Qualitative approach to GI needs to be encouraged: while
 National Competent Authority focus is to increase number of
 registered GIs every year (with annual minimum target 5
 GIs), quality of product specifications, control and traceability
 practices receive less attention.
- National resources allocated to support qualitative GI
 development is insufficient to responds to the needs
 (increasing number of GIs to be managed and same number of
 officials in charge of it)

Way to go



- Link Indonesian GI community with International GI best practices holders
 - Associate Indonesian GI associations to Origin
 - Rise interests of international donors' community on Indonesian opportunities and challenges to further support GI development
 - Encourage private partnership and twinning initiative with best practice holders
